**CALL TO ORDER – Birt Johnson, Jr.**

Due to the Corona Virus pandemic mandated order to shelter in place, Birt Johnson called the Zoom meeting of the Executive Committee of the Community Foundation for Monterey County to order at 3:31 on March 24, 2020.

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

**Motion: to approve the November 25, 2019 minutes as written. Nolan Kennedy / Ida Lopez Chan second. Unanimous vote-motion carries.**

**REPORT OF THE CHAIR – Birt Johnson, Jr.**

Birt shared his observations of the seriousness of the current global Corona Virus pandemic. He spoke of the CFMC's ability to pivot into action and thanked Dan Baldwin and the staff for moving efficiently to establish the technology to move all staff into a remote home working environment. Birt highlighted the CFMC's swift process to set up the Covid19 Relief Fund and follow up with non-profits and donors to assess the situation.

Birt was grateful for the board committee chairs and member's contributions to the organization during this time. Birt has reached out to other board chairs around the state to compare notes and best practices. Birt noted that the fast-moving scenario may require a special board meeting.

**Covid 19 Update – Dan Baldwin**

**Staff and Operations**

Dan described the current work environment at the CFMC and remote home locations. He described the essential nature of some procedures and the staff's roles and responsibilities for funds, grantmaking, scholarships, and general operations.

**Events**

All the CFMC events scheduled through June are postponed.

**Operating Outlook**

The current stock market volatility has required an adjustment to the estimated fund balances. Dan recapped the adjustments that the finance team has made to the operating budgets and reported the CFMC is operationally sound. A cash flow analysis has been developed that will be reviewed and adjusted after quarter end.

### **Covid 19 Relief Fund**

Dan led a conversation about how giving may be impacted by the global scale of the pandemic and that everything is changing rapidly day to day. Dan described the grants, external gifts and other internal gift sources that are building the new fund.

Laurel Lee-Alexander described the simplified on-line grant applications and criteria for approval. The grant requests are assessed and prioritized for the essential services on the front lines. Dan stressed his concern for the immediate needs in the community and the economic pressure in the coming months that will require funds for long term recovery.

Dan recommended another \$200,000 from CFMC discretionary funds be added to the CV19 fund, this would increase the CFMC's discretionary contribution to \$250,000. The 2020 CI grants will be reduced by \$200,000.

**Motion: to approve the addition of \$200,000 into the Covid 19 Relief Fund.**  
**Betsy Buchalter Adler / Maija West second. Unanimous motion carries.**

### **Funder Cohort**

The Covid 19 Relief Fund was created with seed money from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation, CFMC interfund transfers, Clair Giannini Fund, other local funders and donor advised funds. The CFMC field of interest funds have been analyzed for matches to the Covid 19 fund.

### **DAF Communication**

Christine Dawson summarized the immediate actions taken by the philanthropic services team. The website, social media and print ads all converted to the Covid Relief Fund information and resources. The committee had a conversation about the economic impact of lay-offs, business closures and lack of safety nets for the unemployed people and long-range support that will be needed for the recovery.

### **Ratification of approvals done electronically.**

To minimize the need for face-to-face interaction, lessen the frequency for Birt, or other officers, to come to the office to put second signatures on checks, and expedite grant processing, the Grants and Programs department are asking for an adjustment on the following procedures:

**Motion: to approve the following temporary changes to the CFMC grant-making procedures:**

- Increase staff authorization on grants from \$50,000 to \$250,000
  - A biweekly list of grants \$50,000 and over will be sent to the executive committee, including copies of the checks
  - All grants processed during this time, which are \$50,000 and over, will be called out in the grant report included in the board packet
- Eliminate second signatures on checks over \$20,000
  - Diane has discussed this with our auditor, who feels with proper approval by the executive committee, and complete reporting of checks that fall into this exception, this is acceptable
  - A biweekly detailed list of checks will be sent to the executive committee, including copies the checks
- Authorize a \$50,000 transfer of discretionary grant funds to the COVID 19 Relief Fund
  - These funds will be moved from unrestricted and field-of-interest funds
  - It will reduce available Community Impact Grant Program dollars, but staff feels this is an urgent priority

These exceptions to our regular procedures and protocols will only be in place during the time we are working remotely. Once approved, this information will be shared with the staff involved in the process.

**Michael Reid / Betsy Buchalter Adler second. Unanimous vote motion carries.**

Ida Lopez Chan recommended approval of the 11 first round grants from the Covid 19 Fund.

**Motion: to approve the 11 grants from the Covid 19 Relief Fund for \$317,500.**

**Nolan Kennedy / Michael Reid second. Unanimous vote-motion carries**

**TREASURERS REPORT- Jan Vanderbilt**

Jan reported the February financial statement will be approved at the April board meeting.

There was a language adjustment made to the 2019 Operating Reserve Policy, “the Finance Committee ***shall consider*** whether any amounts in excess shall be placed into the board designated reserve.” (policy currently reads ***will consider***).

**Motion: to approve the language in the revised 2019 Operating Reserve Policy.**

**Jan Vanderbilt / Maija West second. Unanimous vote-motion carries**

**INVESTMENT COMMITTEE – Giff Lehman**

Giff reported that the investment committee held a special meeting to review the CFMC Investment Policy Statement for direction as to the best approach of action during the volatility of the stock market during this pandemic. The committee decided that “stay the course” was the best practice at this time and will reassess at its May 8 meeting.

**COMMUNITY IMPACT INVESTING –**

**Nolan Kennedy**

Nolan reported that he and Dan met with Stewart Fuller, CEO of Monterey Credit Union, to discuss the possibility of working with MCU to create a down payment assistance program for MPUSD schoolteachers. Stewart was interested and willing to pursue the idea. Nolan and Dan then met with MPUSD superintendent PK Diffenbaugh, who affirmed that such a program would be of great assistance to MPUSD’s ability to retain teachers.

**GRANTS AND PROGRAMS COMMITTEE – Ida Lopez Chan**

Report items covered earlier in the meeting.

**GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE – Betsy Buchalter Adler**

The committee discussed whether to approach two potential board members during this Covid 19 crisis. The consensus of the executive committee was to move ahead and ask the nominees now. Their terms will be retroactive as of January 1, 2020.

There are two people that will be contacted are from Union Bank and First Five.

## **Goal One: Community Impact**

### **Deploy charitable and intellectual capital towards healthy, safe and vibrant communities across Monterey County.**

Good grant making is fundamentally the effective deployment of charitable assets. Through the ever-evolving Community Impact program, the marked increase in scholarship funds and closely working with donor advisors, the CMFC's grant making invests in solutions to Monterey County's greatest needs. The CFMC remains committed to developing and implementing grant programs that have focus and result in tangible and demonstrable impact, utilizing creativity and an entrepreneurial orientation. All grant programs will align with investing in ***Healthy, Safe, Vibrant Communities*** across Monterey County. Goal one will be driven by the following five statements:

- 1. Initiate, partner and lead in addressing and bringing resources to community challenges.**
- 2. Seek efficiencies in discretionary grant programs that allow for expanded utilization of program staff in all grant activities, community initiatives and needs assessments.**
- 3. Work closely with donor advisors to align their interests with community need.**
- 4. Strengthen nonprofit sector excellence.**
- 5. Focus on opportunity/achievement gaps that will increase equity in Monterey County.**

## **Goal Two: Philanthropic Leadership**

### **Inspire and facilitate philanthropy for equitable outcomes throughout Monterey County.**

The Community Foundation for Monterey County has a growing asset base and an enviable percentage of endowed and/or discretionary assets. The CFMC's commitment to building endowed funds, primarily through planned gifts, has never waned. Greater, lasting impact can be achieved through gifts that name the Fund for Monterey County (unrestricted and field of interest assets). The gift life cycle of creating these funds through estate planning requires tremendous patience.

The CFMC's commitment to stronger relationships with donor advisors is producing greater impact. We must continue to build on this success and adhere to a resource development plan that actively engages and updates the professional advisor community, and always offer philanthropic value to individuals, families, corporations and private foundations.

Diversity in Monterey County takes many forms, including geography, ethnicity, gender, and philanthropic interests. The CFMC must be aware of the ever-changing nature of Monterey County and the importance of developing lasting and sincere relationships while promoting philanthropy to all our communities.

All resource development efforts should celebrate the power of philanthropy and reinforce that a strong culture of philanthropy in Monterey County creates lasting, positive impacts. Goal two will be driven by the following six statements:

- 1. Seek and align funding partners, both internal and external, to realize greater community impacts and a more just and equitable Monterey County.**
- 2. Educate the public about philanthropy and its impacts. Engage professional advisors in a thoughtful and strategic way.**
- 3. Grow discretionary assets (Fund for Monterey County) in order to resource the CFMC's ability to make targeted investments and respond to changing needs over time.**

- 4. Enhance fund holder philanthropy through responsive service and donor education; continue to seek greater alignment between donor advised grant making and prioritized need.**
- 5. Engage a more diverse philanthropic donor base.**
- 6. Elevate CFMC visibility countywide; tell our story more effectively to targeted and general audiences.**

### **Goal Three: Community Leadership**

**Utilize CFMC's position as a trusted leader to facilitate solutions to community issues.**

The Community Foundation for Monterey County is a recognized leader. As the CFMC increased its transparency, reached out to diverse audiences across the county, enhanced the work and profile of the Center for Nonprofit Excellence, and developed stronger partnerships with agencies and regional funders many sectors look to the foundation as an honest broker on difficult issues. Community leadership requires diplomacy, marked by a desire to achieve positive outcomes rather than work toward pre-conceived CFMC solutions. Goal three will be driven by the following five statements.

- 1. Be aware of emerging circumstances and issues for which the CFMC can play a positive role in finding community solutions.**
- 2. Utilize our voice for a just and equitable society.**
- 3. Prepare for and respond proactively to emergencies, disasters, civic unrest, and other circumstances in which the staff and board of directors feel the CFMC can use its expertise in gathering and dispersing resources or offering voice.**
- 4. Utilize advocacy as a tool to support initiatives that align with the CFMC's core values. This may be accomplished through participation in the League of California Community Foundations advocacy work, working with the Council on Foundations or other national lobbying groups, partnering with local organizations, or, when appropriate, developing our own initiatives.**
- 5. Continue to seek opportunities to deploy CFMC financial assets for community impact beyond grant making.**

**Goal Four: Organizational Excellence**  
**Optimize performance and stewardship for maximum effectiveness and continuing trust.**

The CFMC must be an exceptional organization. It is not only our standard, but it is expected by donors, grantees and the community. This requires a commitment to excellence and constant reappraisal of our systems. Our operations and organizational structure (including governance) must stay on the cusp of evolving best practices, whether in technology, internal systems, governance, or staffing. Organizational excellence informs our ability to be effective grant makers, stewards of trust and assets and be nimble in the face of changing community need. Goal four will be driven by the following six statements:

- 1. Continue to identify and invest in scalable infrastructure (people, financial and technological) improvements aligned with CFMC's goals.**
- 2. Maintain an inclusive, engaged and innovative board of directors and staff that reflect a diverse Monterey County.**
- 3. Foster an organizational culture with which people (donors, board members, staff, volunteers) want to align.**
- 4. Be driven by and transparent about the CFMC's mission, vision and values.**
- 5. Be a strong steward of CFMC financial assets and donor intent.**
- 6. Operate in an environmentally responsible way.**

For the Four Months Ended April 30, 2020**

**Assets**

Total Assets through 4/30/2020 are \$274,187,717 a 4.63% increase since April 2019 and a 6.05% decrease since December 2019.

**Charitable Remainder Trusts (CRT) and Charitable Gift Annuities (CGA)**

The CRT and CGA funds have been adjusted to reflect the activity and balances per Kaspick & Company and the third-party account balances as of December 31, 2019.

**Realized and Unrealized Gains and Losses on Investments**

Net year-to-date realized losses were \$23,592, and unrealized losses were \$23,592,036, for a total loss of \$23,615,628.

**Operating Fund**

Total revenue was \$143,850 more than the budget, and total expenses were \$22,664 less than the budget. Unrealized losses were \$19,766 on the operating reserve held in the Medium-Term Fund portfolio. The actual net operating deficit is \$165,405 compared to a budgeted deficit of \$353,712.

Note: The Expendable Operating Cash-on-Hand is at 6.4 months, excluding the operating reserve of \$500,000 and the building reserve of \$150,000.

**Portfolio Performance**

The market value of the Long-Term Fund portfolio at 4/30/2020 was \$219,647,220. The one-year Total Return for the Long-Term Endowment Portfolio was -3.8% compared to the Policy Index of -1.8%.

The market value of the Medium-Term Fund portfolio at 4/30/2020 was \$7,699,459. The one-year Total Return for the Long-Term Endowment Portfolio was 3.6% compared to the Policy Index of 4.6%.

The market value of the ESG Fund portfolio at 4/30/2020 was \$3,565,963. The one-year Total Return for the Long-Term Endowment Portfolio was 0.9% compared to the Policy Index of 1.4%.

The market value of the DRIM Fund portfolio at 4/30/2020 was \$2,149,276. The one-year Total Return for the DRIM Portfolio was -12.3% compared to the Policy Index of -29.6%. Due to the timing of the DRIM reports, there is a one-month lag in the performance reporting.

**Special Program Funds**

Total Special Program revenue was \$396,685 and total expenses were \$5,381,184, which includes \$5,256,448 in grants from the 2019 Monterey County Gives campaign.
